Terrance Arthur Totton was born in Kansas City, MO, on July 21, 1954. He died at home in Richland, MO, on Thursday, November 22, 2012. He was united in marriage with Becky Smith of Pleasant Hill, MO, on February 14, 1976.

Terry was the beloved youngest son of Wayne Arthur and Bridie (Ahern) Totton of Grain Valley, MO. He attended Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, MO, in the Seventies. He later attended Longview Community College in Lee's Summit, MO. Terry worked in restaurant management for more than a decade, moved on to institutional cooking, commercial hauling, and various other jobs as the years passed.

Terry is predeceased by his parents, his grandparents, his aunts and uncles, and his oldest sister, Mary (Totton) Elliott.

“ My mom asked if I could post here what I posted on Uncle Terry's Facebook wall; she told me she laughed and cried as she read it, and I told her that I did the same as I wrote it. The opening line-- "Well, here it is Sunday morning..."--is a reference to the "letters from Forrest" I mentioned; all of his letters began that way, and for many years my mom and Uncle Terry exchanged letters that began with that line, a sort of inside joke that brings a sorrowful smile now. As I've hurried and scurried through my busy-ness this week, I've found that last week's tragic news keeps getting buried under piles of the everyday. But in quiet moments, when the unimportant stuff slows or ceases, I find myself jolted all over again with the sudden realization that Uncle Terry is really gone, and that a truly humble and gentle soul has been called home to rest from this world's troubles. My message to Uncle Terry:

Dear Uncle Terry,

Well, here it is Sunday morning, and I'm trying to come to terms with the news I got on Friday morning. I've been thinking about that time we spent the stormy night in that abandoned house, reading letters from Forrest. You and my dad set up the wood stove and built a fire, but the chimney pipe kept falling out and crashing to the floor. We went floating on the Big Piney the next day, and you were steering the canoe, my dad in front, me in the middle. I wasn't entirely confident of your steering abilities, and as the nose of the canoe headed toward the shore, I decided to step out. You and my dad went into the water, and I held on. So many memories--mixed vegetables, your shogun impersonation, your gigantic cat Rolo, the time one of our cats jumped on your face in the middle of the night. And mostly your genuine kindness and gentleness, the way you kept everyone around you constantly laughing. Also, a lot of guilt, guilt for not being around more often, for not dropping in and saying hi more often. You fought far more than your fair share of demons--never really getting to know the love of your mother, your dad dying during your fragile teenage years--but you kept smiling, and kept others smiling. I'm sure I never said it because, well, we don't say it in our family, but I love you Uncle Terry. And I miss you, as so many

other people miss you. I hope you've found some measure of peace. Until we meet again, Uncle Terry.
